Also in February, Right Worshipful District Grand Master Lloyd Walters and I attended a reception at Can-Am Lodge, Stephenville for the kick-off of a 50-50 campaign by that group where Can-Am Lodge members will sell tickets on a monthly basis with profits being shared between Mazol and that group. An interesting thing about that group of 7 or 8 Nobles, who call themselves, 'Bay St. George Shriners' is that they are members of Mazol only. The day also included discussion on the possibility of them becoming members of The Long Range Shrine Club in Corner Brook, and we look forward to the possibility of that becoming a reality. That day also saw the Assistant Manager of the Royal Bank of Canada present me with a check for



\$1,000 for our Patient Travel Fund. That visit and presentation will be further explained in a separate report from the District Grand Master Walters, who is also President of the Long Range Shrine Club, and Chief Aide for Lady Olive and I this year.

During March and April, much work was done toward the formation of the newly created Mazol Strategic Planning and Growth Committee, which was posted to the Mazol Web Site on April 15th for all to view with the opportunity to make any comments and suggestions. The program was presented and explained at the Stated Meeting held at the Mazol Shrine Centre on May 16th, and sub-committees are now ready to begin their work to review six categories of Mazol business practices. The plan is for the six sub-committees to present their recommendations in those categories at the Stated Meeting to be held on October 31st at the Shrine Centre. Also this meeting determines your Temple's placement in the parade and I am pleased to say we are in 4th place out of 15! The method of determining this was playing "Texas Hold'em". One item that came up was the necessity to increase International dues by \$15.00. It has been almost 10 years since the last increase and based on the presentation made and the discussions following I think we should all expect to see this become a reality. The other important issue was a change in the dates of one of the future Fall Field Days Sessions. Mazol was to hold the function in 2022 but will now host the event in 2019! This is a very important event for us and we should all consider being involved with its planning and procedure.

Your Divan has started Club visitations and it will now become a very busy summer. We look forward to seeing each of you at those functions as well as the Stated Meetings.

In both Clarenville and Marystown it was great to meet and chat with the Nobles and Ladies present. As was the case in 2014, I am Chairing the organizing committee for the Mazol Charity Golf Tournament, scheduled for the Wilds at Salmonier on September 10th. Last year we were able to contribute over \$20,000 to the PTF after all expenses were paid. This year as we start our Tournament planning activities, we face the challenge of no longer having a main corporate sponsor. M.I. Swaco, an offshore oil company, which has been a very generous financial supporter of Mazol, are dealing with major global industry issues and as a result are reducing their level of support. Nonetheless we are determined to reduce the shortfall by increasing the number of teams, and continuing our efforts to identify a new major sponsor.

The annual Fezeroo is also my responsibility this year. Continuing on the success of previous years, this major fund raiser will again feature ticket kiosks in the Avalon and Village Malls, as well as Malls in Marystown and Corner Brook. Our goal this year will be to sell 100,000 tickets and it is vital to have the support of all the Clubs and units. We are grateful to again have the support of the Hickman Group for the 2015 Fezeroo, in addition to a highly professional team of commercial sellers at all locations. Tickets will be mailed to Nobles shortly, and the public campaign will run from July to September 26th. culminating with a public draw in the Avalon Mall on Saturday the 26th. Please return any unsold tickets to the Temple office before the end of August.

One of the major highlights of this year for me will come in December when Mazol holds its first Annual Christmas Concert at Memorial's School of Music on December 6, 2015. Mark that date on your calendars! Planning has been underway for several months and we have been very fortunate to have received a strong show of support from the Gower Community Band and their Director, Mr. Edsel Bonnell. Through our joint efforts we hope to develop a program that will appeal to all ages. We are presently talking to a number of local performers, and are excited with the prospects of this becoming a top notch concert, with the potential to grow and become a much-anticipated annual event. I expect tickets to go on sale in early Fall.

2015 is a monumental year for Shriners Hospitals with the August opening of the new Montreal Hospital. Lady Sharon and I will be attending the opening ceremonies along with the Divan, other Mazol Nobles and Shriners from across Canada and the United States. Of course, the Montreal activities will be preceded by the Summer Ceremonial to be held in beautiful Rocky Harbour in early August. An excellent program is planned for the weekend, which promises to deliver considerable fun and enjoyment.

Visitations are always a priority for the Divan, and having finished my year as Oriental Guide, I am highly aware of the importance of these outreach activities. Effective communications and awareness are two things which I personally stress and are vital to the continued growth and harmony within our great organization. We started the year with the annual visits to the Clarenville and the Boot Shrine Clubs in early May, and look forward to other visits across the Island throughout the year. I would like to take this opportunity to bring you up to date with our financial results for the four months ended April 30, 2015

The Patient Transportation Fund

had revenues of \$160,000 (Budget -\$85,000) and incurred expenses of \$114,000 (Budget-\$85,000) for a four month surplus of \$46,000 (Budget – break even). These numbers reflect the value of West Jet passes which was \$26,000 to the end of April.

The Temple revenues were \$65,000 for the four months and expenses for the period were \$66,000 for a deficit \$1,000. Our budget for the year is to break even. All our operating expenses are within budget.

As I write we have \$6,235 outstanding for annual dues. For those who haven't paid please forward your payment by cheque or Visa to Cecilia as soon as possible.

As I am sure you are all aware Ill. Sir Doug Beattie has formed a Strategic Planning & Growth Committee and as part of that initiative I, with two other nobles, are looking at "Restructure of Stated Meetings". I would like to hear from any noble who likes the way the stated meetings are currently held or who has ideas for change. Do we need to spend more or less time on financial issues? Do we want more or less financial information? What can be done to increase attendance? Where should stated meetings be held? These are just some of the ideas that our Committee will consider. We would be delighted to hear from you. My email is mbruce@nfld.net and my phone number is 576-3578.

Nobles and Ladies, once again I want to thank the Nobility for their confidence and support in electing me for another year as your Recorder. It is a position I enjoy and it continues to be a learning experience. As a child, my parents constantly drilled into my head, the importance of always telling the truth. I'm sure all of your parents did the same. I was constantly told that, while telling the truth may not always keep you out of trouble, the consequences will be far less than if you don't tell the truth.

In the December issue of the Mirror, I stated what I firmly believe to be the truth about some concerns I have with what could happen within Mazol, if immediate steps aren't taken to make changes. My parents were right; the truth doesn't always keep you out of trouble. However, from conversations I have had with a fairly large number of Nobles, I do believe that those who agree with the truth, as I perceive it, outnumber those who don't. I make no apologies and will state again, if the Clubs don't provide financial support for Temple operations, then Mazol cannot survive.

It's very encouraging to be able to report that many of the Clubs now recognize this, and in accordance with the approved 2015 budget, they have been making contributions to the Temple.

On another positive note, I have every reason to be optimistic that under the leadership of Ill. Sir Doug Beattie, who is one of the most conscientious and dedicated Potentates we have had, we are now on the right course to taking the necessary steps, which are required to allow us to grow and be a strong Temple.

At recent Potentate's Visitations to the Clarenville/Bonavista and the Boot Shrine Clubs, and also at the May Stated Meeting, Ill. Sir Doug outlined to the Nobility, the strategic planning and growth initiatives he is implementing this year. The Divan is solidly behind him in this endeavor, and from feedback so far from the Nobles who have heard it, and those who have checked it out on our web site, they are quite agreeable as well. With total support from all, Ill. Sir Doug's initiative can have a positive impact on Mazol.

I am very pleased to be able to report that Westjet has once again come through with a donation of 130 free one-way flights, a slight increase over last year. This will have a huge impact on our efforts to fund Patient travel costs. We are deeply grateful for this tremendous gift from Westjet, and all Shriners are again encouraged to use Westjet as the airline of choice for all personal travel. With 4 black camel visitations, 2 demits, 3 new creations and 1 affiliation, our membership is now 522, which is down by 1 from the beginning of the year. We presently have a number of applications on file, and we expect at least some of those applicants to be initiated at the Summer Ceremonial. We are also optimistic that several more candidates will be initiated before the end of the year. We therefore have the potential to have a net increase in membership this year, and that would be a huge plus for Mazol.

Increasing membership must continue to be a primary focus, and I once again urge every member to make an effort to recruit new candidates. Club executives are encouraged to call your Membership Chairman, Noble Rolly Card at any time you feel a presentation in your area may be of some benefit. Your Membership Committee will respond promptly.

The Harold W. Duffett Shriners R.V. Park in Eastport continues to be a huge success. We have 155 sites, 103 of which are fully booked seasonal. Bookings for all sites have been going extremely well, with a big demand for this year.

No further major expansions are planned at this time. Our Shriners R.V. Park truly is a tremendous asset, which will become more and more valuable as time goes by.



PATIENT CHAIRMAN'S Report



The usual Patient activity has been ongoing at a steady pace. As there was no Outreach clinic scheduled for the fall of 2014 more patients traveled to Montreal for appointments. This affected our travel cost.

Philadelphia Patient

On Feb 21-2015 I received a phone call from Noble Larry Moss to inform me that a 14 year old boy had suffered a back injury in a skiing accident and that he may require assistance from our spinal injury unit in Philadelphia. I immediately contacted relevant members of the Divan, as well as Noble Sid Dyke Patient Co-ordinator for St. John's Shrine Club. Noble Sid then visited the Family at the Janeway Hospital, and with their help arrangements were made to transport the injured boy, Malcolm Hollett to Philadelphia for an assessment.

I have kept in touch with the patient's father, Mr. Phil Hollett by phone several times since. At the latest speaking with him On May 23 2015 from Philadelphia Hospital he said that Malcolm is responding to physiotherapy very well with many mussels of his legs responding. The latest is that he has been walking 300-500 ft with ankle braces only, Good news indeed !!. Mr. Hollett wishes for me to express their most sincere gratitude for the great work that the Mazol Shriners are doing for Malcolm and his family as a whole. Malcolm is continuing his academic studies while in Philadelphia Shriners Hospital. Mr. Hollett also said that he was very impressed with the staff at the Philadelphia Hospital. They have been outstanding in all their dealings with Malcolm and the family. (Mr.Hollett has given me permission to use their names in this report.)

On Mar 5, 2015 Noble Sid Dyke made arrangements for a Shrine patient Miss Chelsea Hart and her family to attend and speak at the N.L.C.A Conference that was held in St. John's.



Spring Outreach Clinic

The Spring Outreach Clinic was held on May 11-12, 2015 with 19 patients attending - 17 regular patients and 2 new applicants. DR. Fassier has referred 5 Patients to Montreal Shriners Children's Hospital for treatment.

As usual, I met Dr. Fassier along with his Clinical Assistant on their arrival at Gander Airport on the afternoon flight of May 11-2015. After a coffee break we proceed to the Hotel to check in, then on to JPM Hospital to start his Clinic 2:00 pm until 4:00 pm. The following day, May 12 Dr. Fassier resumed his clinic at JPM Hospital and saw the remainder of the appointments which was completed at 11.00 am. Then to the Airport for lunch and their return flight to Montreal. Many thanks to our Potentate, Ill Sir Doug Beattie, Assistant Raban, Noble Rolly Card, as well as their ladies along with Noble Tom Goulding, Noble Len Norris, Noble Gerald Winsor and Noble Ev Green for their assistance to the patients and their families at the clinic.

For one young man Sheldon Norris it was great news for him when Dr. Fassier advised him he will not need to return for any more visits – he's free. I first met Sheldon in September 1999 when he was 15 months old and he was one of the first patients I took an application for. Since then he has been to the Gander Outreach Clinic for many visits as well he's been to The Montreal Shriners Hospital for a number of procedures and surgeries. Sheldon

has made great progress with Shriners over the years and we have watched him slowly but surely be able to do the things he might not have been able to do. It was just 5 years ago when he found he did not need braces anymore. Being given this good news he left the Examining Room and proceeded to throw the braces down the corridor as he walked out of JPMH in Gander. It was a great moment for him and for the Shriners present. This time it was a very memorable and heartwarming time again for all present. That's the results we hope for with all our patients and why we do what we do.

Patient Stats

So far this year, forty-nine children were given 59 Appointments with 25 having been completed. There are still 33 pending - 14 for Montreal and 18 for Gander One Patient is still in Philadelphia -Total Cost so far this year \$96,508.65. This amount includes an air ambulance flight to Philadelphia = \$37,753.96.

Nobles I urge you to keep up the good work of supporting the Patient Travel Fund. As you can see by the figures above, at anytime we may be challenged to support our commitment to the patients and their families who depend on us to improve their way of life.

The Mazol Shrine Centre (MSC) management board continues to meet on a bi-weekly basis. The current members of the board are listed below and I would like to thank them for their continuing support and dedication.

As I stated at the Annual General Meeting we had planned to do some capital improvements to the exterior of the building this year ... but unfortunately time caught up with OUR building and we were forced to replace all the roofing over the banquet hall. Indeed on one section of the banquet hall the aspenite had deteriorated to a point that 15 sheets of plywood was needed. While we had the roofing contractor was on site the roofing cover on the side storage area and office was also replace as well as flashing on the front of the Shrine Centre was also fixed. The cost for this work was approximately \$90,000. \$50,000 was funded by the Shrine Centre with the Divan providing a five year loan for \$40,000 (standard average 5 year GIC interest rate applicable).

As a result we obviously have had to curtail our capital plans and also have implemented spending restraint policy that will be reviewed next year.

All of this was accomplished without any loss of rental income and we were able to continue Bingo without interruption. Thank you to everyone who contributed to meeting and overcoming this challenge!!!

The Bingo team, under the leadership on Nobles Ches Lambert and Albert Piercey, continue to work tirelessly should always be recognized for their efforts. This work is vital to the continued operations of the Mazol Shrine Centre and is always in need of extra support from the Nobility. We now have five Bingo callers, each of which has their own team 4 or helpers. This is in addition to the "regular" help that Noble Ches and Albert receive. This system has truly lightened the load as well as providing an opportunity for Nobles who could not commit full time to contribute. Following and in support of this priority, it was decided that the newly released website would come under the responsibility of the Publicity and Public Relations Committee. This action was to complement the publishing of The Mirror which has been published for quite a long time. The publishing of The Mirror and the operation of the website has successfully continued since that time.

It is worthy of note that Mazol communications have been very effective in the past. In 2014 the Mazol Mirror got high recognition from Shrine International and there has been a consistent following of the Mazol web site. These and other tools can do much more but there has to be closer liaison between all those involved with Mazol communications so that a consistent, well-structured messages can be achieved.



Some Health and Safety Facts:

Backpack Safety

When a child's backpack does not fit properly, it can injure muscles or joints and lead to other medical issues.

An appropriate backpack is one that is:

- No wider than the user's chest
- Worn no higher than the base of the neck
- Worn no lower than 2 to 4 inches below the waist
- Supported by a waist or chest strap
- Made of lightweight material

Vitamin D Deficiency

Severe vitamin D deficiency is becoming more prevalent, causing devastating health problems, including improper bone growth.

To maintain a healthy level of vitamin D, consider :

- Increasing foods such as milk, orange juice and salmon into a child's diet.
- Finding a healthy balance between sun intake and sunscreen application.
- Including vitamin D, either in gummy or liquid form, in a child's daily vitamin intake (when age appropriate).

Lawn Mower Safety

In 2010, approximately 253,000 people were treated for lawn mower-related injuries, nearly 17,000 of them children. By taking precautionary measures, serious and sometimes deadly injuries can be prevented.


So to summarize, like all the parades we take part in, we may not be always moving along at top speed. However, you can rest assured, we will be there. Like the two headed mini there are


It was also my pleasure to attend the Gander Hospital for the outreach clinic in May, where eighteen Shrine patient children were seen by Dr. Fassier and his

the Ladies of the Sabre work so hard for. Once again I thank you for the great job you do.




