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This will be my last opportunity to address the membership, prior to the annual meeting, so on behalf of myself and Lady Helen, a sincere thank you for your support over the past 5 years. It has been an exhilarating journey for both of us. We have met many new Nobles and their Ladies, and enjoyed working with all of you. While I have no illusions that everything is now done, I hope we have made a positive contribution.

A special meeting of the Divan and club representatives took place in Gander on Nov 25th, to address misunderstandings and concerns with respect to some aspects of Mazol Shriners operations, and to consider options for addressing the challenges the Divan and Nobility face going forward. This very productive meeting was attended by 7 of the 10 clubs. Details of the meeting discussions are being compiled and will be forwarded to the clubs.

This year we continued to experience interpersonal conflict in some quarters, that undercut the very principles our Shrine fraternity espouses, in a way that is not constructive or helpful to the promotion of peace and harmony among our membership. I believe this is a major factor in our inability to attract and retain more new members, and is at least partially responsible for some of our membership loss. We spend far too much energy infighting over matters for which there is no evidence that effort spent on those matters will benefit Mazol Shriners or our Philanthropy. It is my hope that we will all place the greater good of our fraternity, and Philanthropy, at the centre of our interactions going forward. In doing so, we will be better able to tap into the full talent, skill, and enjoyment of our members, and at the same time be more attractive to potential new members.

This year has presented some additional challenges with the failure of our only major Mazol Shriners operations fundraiser, the Fezeroo. In response, we have cut expenses by about \$10,000.00 for the year, and to make up the shortfall to budget of \$50,000.00 have asked the clubs for additional contributions to cover that amount. Keep in mind, that without sufficient funds to cover expenses, Mazol Shriners cannot continue to operate.

Membership growth is the single largest issue facing Mazol Shriners going forward. If we are unable to stop and reverse the declining trend we are headed to numbers that will not support having a shrine center within the province at all. While this is also a Shrine International issue, it is one that can only be solved by each Noble taking on the challenge of bringing in new members, as a personal goal. Our Imperial Potentate, Imperial Sir Gary Bergenske, has made membership growth a top priority and is spreading the message everywhere he goes. His slogan is “**I am committed now, R U**”. The point is we need everyone pulling on the same end of the rope, all of the time, to make it happen. **If we don't solve this problem, it very likely won't matter 10 years from now if we had a finance committee, or whether we sell or keep the Topsail Road Mazol headquarters property.**

On the positive side, we have much to be proud of; our H W Duffett RV Park PTF loan will be paid in full this year and the park board plans to make the final payment on its ACOA loan in 2018. As a result, our RV Park is now positioned to contribute a significant financial return to Mazol annually.

After a one-year absence, when they held their AGM outside the province, the Newfoundland and Labrador Construction Association (NLCA), is returning in 2018, and have committed to supporting Mazol PTF with funds raised at their annual meeting charity auction gala in March. The NLCA have contributed over \$350,000.00 to Mazol since they chose us as their charity of choice.

We were honoured to represent Mazol Shriners this year at the Duke of Edinburgh Volunteer Hall of Fame Awards. Mazol Shriners was inducted into the hall for our volunteer activities in support of our Philanthropy, Shriners Hospitals for Children, and the children and their families that we support within this province.

Lady Helen's pin project was a great success thanks to the Nobles and Ladies that have supported her through purchases and donations at our visitations and events this year. The Montreal Hospital was presented with two amounts totaling over \$5,000.00 to date, towards the purchase of specialized research

equipment. Thanks again to everyone who contributed to her fundraising project.

We started the Wandering Divan newsletter this year, and including this one, have published four issues during the year. Feedback has been positive. This is a very cost-effective communications vehicle that can continue to be a timely and effective means of communication between the nobility and Mazol Shriners leadership.

We have a core group of Nobles and ladies that continue to support our clubs, units and the Shrine centre, and as a result we have been able to carry out our programs and meet our commitments. Our patient care system is working well thanks again to the dedicated Nobles and ladies that work many volunteer hours to make that happen, **AND**, we are recognized in the community as a highly respected organization that does great work to assist kids and their families that need our help. Yes.... we do make a difference in the lives of the children that we help, and their families; and so, a genuine **thank you**, for everything that you do to make that difference.

Nobles and Ladies, my term on the Divan will end shortly. A new Potentate will be elected to guide Mazol Shriners forward and I wish him every success. There is no doubt about the need for the service we provide or the benefit to our kids and their families. We love what we do, and we get a great deal of satisfaction from doing it, and we know you do as well. Let's keep doing it together, and most importantly, let's keep our masonic principles front and centre as we do so.

Finally, we have to say a special thank you to the team that supported us this year. Your help and support were very much appreciated. Basically, we just had to show up at our planned events, and everything else was in place. Believe me that meant a lot. Thank you again.

New Membership Referral Program Introduced

Shriners International has introduced the I AM RU program, a membership recruitment program with a new focus, new tools and detailed plans which is meant to bring in 12,000 new creations by the 2018 Imperial Session. The overall success of this program depends on the commitment of individual Shriners to "Share Your Shrine" with friends, and on temples to meet/exceed their best number of creations in the last five years – if every noble and every temple does these things, we will be very close to achieving that goal of 12,000 new members. The new program will capitalize on the increasing awareness of Shriners International, and on new technology in WebFez that provides improved information regarding the progress and status of new member prospects, so that we can offer timely help and encouragement as they work through the process.

Using Technology for Membership Recruitment

The I AM RU program is a new approach to membership development that incorporates a referral program linked to WebFez that allows current nobles to directly refer names of friends, family members and acquaintances they feel would make good Shriners. The prospective member is linked with his referring noble, promoting natural mentorship based on an existing friendship or acquaintance. The new process can be tracked and reported, and each referral triggers automatic communications to the referring noble and the prospect. Once a noble makes a referral, he receives tools and resources to mentor his prospect and hopefully lead him to creation. The program encourages constant collaboration, so that every noble can share their fraternity with the good men around them.

Attracting Interest through Well-planned Social Events

An important element of the new program is that it encourages temples to host fellowship parties and rush events to promote interest and attract membership prospects, and provides guidance that helps ensure success. For example, fellowship parties should be in a relaxed environment and have an open table/social concept, with no formalized membership presentation. These events should be open to prospective members, without pressure for membership recruitment or restoration; and membership literature should be available upon request.



Rush events have an open house, social and educational aspects, and are open to prospective members and their families. A multi-faceted presentation providing information on Shriners International, including temple clubs and units, as well as information on Masonry and affiliated organizations, is encouraged at these events. Membership literature should also be provided to all attendees.

Our goal for each Imperial Year is less suspensions, less demits and more affiliations. The leadership of Shriners International has added the ambitious goal of 12,000 new creations from Session to Session. This goal is attainable if temples focus on matching and surpassing their own best number of creations in the last five years.

There are many resources available to help us reach our membership goals. Using the new WebFez referral system is the perfect place to start, and beashrinernow.com is still a great resource. There are also several helpful tools on Shriners Village, including the Membership Toolkit, Roadmap to Membership Success, and Marketing Materials Ordering System. We encourage temples and nobles to work with their Regional Membership Director and the Office of Membership Development, and to send your temple membership team to the annual Membership Seminar for invaluable tips and information.

Presentation by Tara Lynch, Mother of Patient Keaton Lynch at the Summer Ceremonial Dinner



Good evening ladies and gentleman. It is an absolute pleasure to be here this evening with my husband, Mike, and our youngest son, Keaton. We are here tonight to share with you the journey that our family has been on since Keaton's birth, and to impart to you just what a profound impact Shriners has had on that journey.

Keaton was born on January 28th, 2014, 6 weeks premature. When he was discharged from the Neonatal Intensive Care Unit we had no inkling of what path our lives were soon to take, or of how very much we would need the assistance of others to help us on that path. I am a Guidance Counsellor in a Kindergarten to Grade Six school and have worked with children with special needs for 14 years. Very early on in Keaton's life, I knew that he was having to work harder to reach the same goals that his big brothers had reached with ease. However, it took months to be heard and many insistent hours to get him seen by those who needed to see him.

Our baby boy was officially diagnosed with Spastic Diplegic Cerebral Palsy in April of 2014. He was 14 months old. In the first 15 minutes of that 6-hour appointment, a medical professional asked if we had stairs in our home. When I replied that we did, she suggested we put it on the market because "he was never going to walk". I will never, ever forget that moment. I came home to share the news with my husband, other family members, and friends. When my father was told what that professional had said his response was very definite... "How could she know that at his age? I do not accept that. I will not accept that. That little boy will walk in to Kindergarten!"

So we began the journey.... as a family. Keaton's interdisciplinary team soon included a Physiotherapist, Occupational Therapist, Speech-Language Pathologist, Pediatrician, Orthopedic Surgeon, ENT, Ophthalmologist, and Neurologist. His physiotherapist, Renee, began working with him the following week and within a few weeks he was crawling, holding up his own head, and learning to sit on a bench. We were ecstatic! Now we had a professional telling us all of the things he could do as opposed to all of the things he could not. She suggested that we contact Shriners right away as she felt strongly that Keaton would be a good candidate

for Selective Dorsal Rhizotomy surgery. We began researching the procedure and decided that it was most definitely an avenue we wanted to pursue. So we made the call and held our breath.

A few days later, a Shriner, Dave Cooper, came to our home. He was organized, friendly, well-informed, and most of all- positive. He took the necessary information and assured us we would hear from them soon. We were

soon contacted with a date to fly to Montreal for a Cerebral Palsy Clinic. We were shocked at how seamless the process had been! We literally did not even have to leave our home. For a family that had spent months going back and forth to appointments that was an amazing and very welcome change.

Keaton and I made that initial trip to Shriners and then traveled again for the Selective Dorsal Rhizotomy Clinic in July of 2016. It was at this time that he was seen by the Shriners team and Dr. Jean-Pierre Farmer, Neurosurgeon, and he was approved to have the Selective Dorsal Rhizotomy done. I was so relieved he was a candidate but so scared of what was to come. Agreeing to this procedure meant agreeing to have our child undergo an “elective” surgery; one that some may not consider necessary in the truest sense. The purpose of this surgery is to increase the child's mobility. It is done during a 7-hour procedure by separating the spine, stimulating the nerves in the back, and permanently severing those nerves that are causing the most spasticity. It also meant agreeing to leaving home for 7 weeks consecutive.

We placed our full trust in his Physiotherapist at the Jane-way Children's Hospital and in the Shriners team and Keaton was placed on the waitlist. Once again, we held our breath and we waited.

As the months passed different questions came to me and on a number of occasions I e-mailed Shriners staff in Montreal. They replied and answered any questions I had posed. One of the nurses called me several times to discuss timelines and to make sure everything was in place. What I was beginning to understand was that this professionalism and competence were part of the “Shriners experience”. Details are not overlooked and patients are at the center of every decision that is made.

The call came in early April of this year. I had 6 days to clue up at work, to pack, and to prepare for a 7-week, out-of-province medical stay for Keaton and myself. As a parent, that phone call puts you in a sort of auto-pilot. We tried to prepare our older sons, ages 5 and 7 for what was to come, and we tried to wrap our heads around the fact that the family would be apart for almost 2 months. While we did that, Shriners did everything else. Flights and rooms were booked, rides were arranged to and from the airport, hotel, and hospital, appointments were scheduled, and medical teams prepared. After 3 days of pre-op appointments surgery day arrived. This time, I took the very deepest breath I could and left our 3-year-old son

in the arms of strangers to have, what we all hoped, would be life changing surgery.

Keaton's surgery was on a Thursday at Montreal Children's Hospital and he was transferred from there to the Shriners Hospital on Monday. Almost immediately, we felt a calmness. His nurse introduced herself, gave him a new cuddly fleece blanket, and visited him throughout the day. Keaton was excited about his new hospital room but kept asking what the weather was like as there were no windows to the outside. She overheard his questioning and moved him the very next day into a room filled with windows so that he could see for himself. We began to meet with the team members that would be assigned to Keaton for the next 6 weeks and every one of them was child-oriented, positive and prepared.

Keaton's days during those six weeks consisted of two hours of physiotherapy, one hour of occupational therapy, and one hour in the playroom. He had to relearn how to perform all of the motor skills he could do prior to surgery with the aim of having him back to his pre-op skill set by the time he was scheduled to leave Montreal. Afternoon physio was a swimming session 3 of the 5 days a week. These sessions were his absolute favourite! By week three he was using a walker and by the end of that week, his quad canes that he used prior to surgery. Shortly before he left he began using single point canes- a goal that he and his therapist at home worked on vehemently, but were unable to attain with independence due to his spasticity. Then, in week 5, his physiotherapist told me he had walked four steps on his own. On his own! I could never explain to you the feeling we had that day. Keaton kept saying “Mommy, I walked all by myself! Are you so impressed?” The phone calls home brought many tears and joy that I cannot fully explain. Suddenly, our little boy was beginning to stand unassisted, toilet-train, take steps independently, and ride an adaptive bike on his own! Every day my father's words came back to me. He had known all along what so many had not.

It is not any one thing that makes Shriners what it is. It is a multitude of factors that work together to create something wonderful. The staff are so incredibly invested in the children. Every single person- from the custodians to the social workers, knew Keaton's name and celebrated his successes. The facility itself is amazing. It is modern, beautiful, and impeccably cared for.

Perhaps the best way to capture the magic of Shriners is by giving you a few specific examples from our time in Montreal. Fairly frequently, special guests visit the children in the hospital. The Star Wars characters visited during our stay. Keaton was scared of the costumes so they had someone visit his room to give him gifts from the characters to help ease his fear and to ensure he felt included.

The playroom at Shriners is run by a warm, energetic, exuberant staff member named Angi. Every Friday afternoon Angi had a movie and popcorn for the children on the unit. This happened during Keaton's nap time so every Friday Angi ensured that Keaton got his popcorn. He came to know Fridays as the day he got "popcorn in a bag".

Another inpatient celebrated her 4th birthday while she was there so the staff had a surprise birthday party for her, sang happy birthdays in 3 different languages and invited all of the children on the unit.

Nurses' week was recognized during our stay and the nurses were invited to have their hair, nails and make-up done. So were the mothers of the children at Shriners.

While we were there, Keaton was fascinated with the large floor cleaner that was used to clean the unit. Realizing this, the custodian stopped the cleaner and posed for a picture with Keaton.

On the day that Keaton took those amazing first steps I could not help but brag to the staff about his huge accomplishment. Three of the nurses, Lucy, Jasmine and Cheryl, went on a hunt around the hospital to snag a pink stuffed hippo for Keaton as a reward because he had seen other children with that toy and they knew he really liked it.

Another of his nurses, Shauma, let him play with the thermometer every shift she worked with him because she knew this made him happy.

When Keaton was getting ready to be discharged staff members visited to give him gifts, high fives, hugs, and best wishes. He was very loved and they made sure he felt that.

A number of you here tonight actually visited with Keaton and I while we were at the Shriners Hospital. Roger Tinkham visited on a number of occasions, always checking in when he was in Montreal to see how we were doing

and if we needed anything. He actually brought Keaton a stuffed dog which now sits on his bed at home and goes by the name of Roger.

Every single person whom I have had the pleasure of meeting who is involved with Shriners feels deeply and strongly about the cause. And that is, of course, how it should be, how it must be, when you are part of life-changing experiences like ours. I have no doubt that Keaton will walk in to Kindergarten, as his grandfather so wisely predicted, and I know that each and every one of you here this evening had a part in making that happen.

Never, ever, underestimate the impact you have on children's lives. During our time in Montreal, we met children from Newfoundland, New Brunswick, Ontario, Montreal, Puerto Rico and Africa. Each and every one of these families has a story as well. And all of those stories are enriched because of you. That is profound. We feel very blessed that Keaton is a "Shriners child" and we are sure to share his experience with other families with the hope that another little child's future will be forever changed and enriched by your amazing work. Thank you does not seem enough. You have helped to give our child skills that will allow him to grow into an independent adult. There is no price that can be placed on that. Thank you from Mike and I, from our older sons, Kane and Cohen, from our extended family, and most of all, from Keaton.

Treasurers Report

Nobles,

I would like to take this opportunity to bring you up to date with our preliminary financial results for our 2017 fiscal year.

The Patient Transportation Fund had revenues of \$278,000 and incurred expenses of \$220,000 for a surplus of \$58,000. The revenues and expenses include the value of our West Jet passes which amounted to \$58,000. This compares to 2017 annual budget revenues of \$278,000 and 2017 budgeted expenses of \$294,000 for a budgeted deficit of \$16,000. At our stated meetings, we approved donations to our Hospital of \$24,000. This gives us a surplus for the current year of \$34,000.

The Temple had a difficult year with our Fezeroo making a profit of only \$5,000 which was \$61,000 below budgeted amount. I am pleased to report that the Clubs were able to increase their Fraternal donations to \$103,000 which combined with some cost savings will see us coming close to our budgeted loss of \$8,000. Our expenses were within budget except for insurance which saw an \$2,200 increase.

The loans to the RV Park and the Mazol Shrine Centre have been repaid in full.

It would be appreciated if all Clubs and Units could ensure that their financial reports for the year ended December 31, 2017 are sent to the office by February 15, 2018.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank Cecilia Paddon for her assistance during the year and her diligent work on our behalf.

Food for Thought



Greetings Fellow Nobles,

Recently I have been caused to reflect on the Mystic Shrine which I joined in April 2001. My years in the Shrine for the most part have been very enjoyable and rewarding. I have met many wonderful men through the fraternity and have experienced uncountable hours of great fellowship. I have always been awed over the time and commitments, that Shriners put into helping Children and Shriners Children's hospitals. Every organization, I am sure, would give anything to have the same level of commitment from its members as they see from Shriners.

However, I have also noticed over this period that the shrine is not without its controversy and internal dynamics. Every year or so we hear of some internal issue that seems to spread a layer of cement that, rather than bonding the Nobles together, it seems to plaster them into opposing foundations of nothing pleasant or productive for the fraternity. Politics and power unfortunately cloud the principle of "Nobles being on the level with each other," as Nobles sometimes work undercover campaigns to try and oust one Noble for a perceived "more favourable" candidate to take on a leadership role. I have puzzled long and hard over these issues, and have been reminded of two great Masonic Principles, both of which I am sure you are familiar. First from the Entered Apprentice Degree, "*... should you be about to enter a lodge where there is a brother with whom you are at variance, or against whom you entertain animosity. In such cases it is expected that you will invite him to withdraw, in order that you may settle your difference amicably.*" The second from the third degree, "*... and finally that I will maintain a Masons honour, and carefully preserve it as my own: that I will neither injure him myself, nor knowingly suffer him to be injured by others ...but on the contrary, will boldly repel the slander of his good name ...*".

It appears that in the Shrine, we at times either neglect or forget these principles. Far too often it seems that when a Noble finds himself at odds with another Noble, the first course of action is to create an alliance or camp to support his point of view. The same then gets repeated on the other side. You know what happens after that. The rumors and the distortions are initiated and spread into a schism that becomes almost impossible to resolve, whereas had the two Nobles in the first place sat down and communicated, the issue could have quickly and amicably been resolved.

Let me illustrate with a story I once heard. A young clergy and his wife once arrived at a small village parish. The young clergy was enthusiastic and began to make what he considered to be valuable and necessary changes to the parish, but all to the dismay of one person in the congregation. The man became very angry with the changes he saw taking place and began speaking to the other parishioners, who spoke to other

parishioners. As time went on issues became complaints which then became stories and stories became gossip. Emotions became stronger with each passing of the tale. The young clergy's wife became more and more uncomfortable and felt rejected in the town. Finally, some gossip reached her and she left her husband and of course moved on, to begin a new life. The young clergy unaware of what was behind the gossip continued working in the parish as the disillusioned parishioner continued with his campaign to deface the man of the cloth. Finally, one day the clergyman arrived at the point, where he felt his life was being completely destroyed and he resigned from the parish, explaining in a Sunday sermon how he had suffered over the years. His nemesis finally coming to a realization of what he had done to the clergyman, suffered through a long sleepless night, because of the immense guilt he was feeling.

Early the next morning he arrived at the clergyman's office to find him packing boxes, preparing himself to depart his parish. The man explained that he had come to apologize for the gossip he had spread over the years, finally being aware of the hurt he had caused. The minister was quiet for a while and finally spoke softly to the man saying, "thank-you." The man then asked if there was anything he could do to make up for his terrible behavior. The clergyman thought for a while and said, "yes there is. I want you to take a feather pillow to the top of the hill, there cut it open, releasing the feathers to the wind." Surprised, the man agreed to the task thinking, how strange, as the clergyman passed him a feather pillow. He was feeling somewhat elated that his penance was so minimal. As he was about to pass out through the door the clergyman caught his attention and said "oh, and one more thing! In one hour, I want you to collect all of the feathers and put them back into the pillow case". The Man's jaw dropped. "That is impossible", he cried. The clergyman replies, "it is the same with rumours and gossip, when you throw them out to the wind, you never know where they are going and it becomes impossible to collect them back."

What is the message in this story? I think it is twofold. First, should a Noble ever say to you, "I am going to tell you something but don't tell anyone else." **STOP!** Then politely say, "I would rather that you not tell me that." Second, should a Noble ever start talking to you about another Noble in a manner that is not positive or is a criticism, you need to say, "I think you need to sit down with Noble over a cup of coffee, and work out your differences." With these two little practices, I believe we can all get along in the Mystic Shrine and have a great fellowship together. Let's collectively make this year a time to practice our Masonic principles, and be assured, that from these principles, no discord will ever evolve in the Shrine.

Are You a Shriner?



I once overheard a much-respected member of our District Grand Lodge, and a Past Potentate, say that he didn't understand why all Masons were not Shriners. I have only been a Shriner for about 1 ½ years, having joined the St. John's Shrine Club in October of 2015, and after having been a Mason for about 24 years. In this brief 1 ½ years, I have come to understand those heartfelt sentiments, and I am now of the same opinion.

To be a Shriner is to be part of the greatest philanthropy in the world. Shriners Hospitals for Children was founded in 1922 by 2 Masons in the United States of America, with the goal of providing expert medical care for children with no financial burden to the patients or their families and having fun doing it. Today that philanthropic effort supports the health care system's 22 facilities across the U.S., Canada and Mexico, treating children up to 18 years of age who

have orthopedic conditions, burns, spinal cord injuries, cleft lip and palate, and more. This advanced care is provided in a family-centered environment that is focused on maximizing a child's quality of life, regardless of the families' ability to pay.

In their own words, "Shriners are a brotherhood of men committed to family, engaged in ongoing personal growth, and dedicated to providing care for children and families in need. Our backgrounds and interests are diverse, but we are bound together by our shared values and a desire to have fun, do good and build relationships that can last a lifetime." These words sound familiar don't they, and why shouldn't this be, Shriners and Masons are one and the same.

There are 10 Shrine Clubs situated around our province and they all come under the Mazol Temple located here in St. John's at the Mazol Shrine Centre on Topsail Road, which I am sure many of you have seen as you drove by it. The Mazol Temple, the governance body for Shrine Clubs in this province, is run by the Potentate and the Divan of 7 Shriners who are committed to a 5-year term of office, the same as our own District Grand Master. Like our DGM, it is a tremendous personal commitment where the wives are just as involved and committed as their husbands.

Our present Potentate is Illustrious Sir Rolly Card a member of Lodge Tasker. He has two primary objectives for his year as Potentate; bring all the Shine Clubs and their membership closer together and increase membership. As you know membership is a big concern of our District Grand Lodge and Lodges, and likewise with the Mazol Temple and the Shrine Clubs. The big difference in this regard is that, whereas Freemasonry can seek members from outside of Freemasonry, Shriners can only obtain new members from within Freemasonry

in this province. You have to be a Mason before you can become a Shriner. The various Shrine Clubs around the province are in great need of new members. Without new members on a regular basis, Shrine Clubs will cease to exist and eventually the great works of the Shriners could disappear in this province, not tomorrow, but within 10 years this is possible. The total membership in both constitutions of Freemasonry in this province is about 2700 members. The total membership of the Shrine clubs right now is 463 or about 17 % of the total body of Freemasonry. The Total Shrine membership of 463 members is down 43 members or 8.5% from the previous year. At this rate, it is the primary objective

of The Divan to stop this trend and reverse it. If every Mason was a Shriner, imagine what that would do for the philanthropy?

Imagine, if within 10 years, the Shriners presence disappeared in our province. Local Shriners work tirelessly to raise hundreds of thousands of dollars every year in this province to support the children of this province. They have raised millions since the first shrine club was formed in this province. Shriners/Masons and their wives have made this happen. It is the greatest Masonic Charity we have and we can all be very proud of those Masons who have become Shriners and do this work unselfishly. They do it in an environment of fun and are rewarded with the smiles and love for the children they help every single day.

If you become a Shriner I promise that you will be filled with the same desire to help the children. You will find a great body of Masons dedicated to the cause and building long lasting friendships with you. Your wives and children will be proud of what you do for the children.

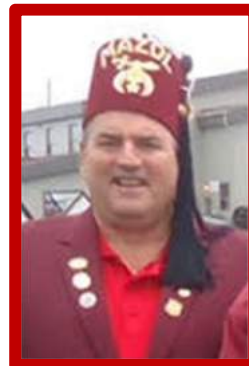
