






The Mazol Mirror



My Installation Speech

I have jotted down a few things that I would like to touch on tonight, but first and foremost I want to take a moment to thank all the Nobles and Ladies in this room, as well as the Nobility across the Island and in Labrador for the terrific work you are doing in support of our great philanthropy. Your ongoing efforts continue to make Mazol stand out across Canada.

It's such a personal thrill for Sharon and me to be here tonight kicking off our year as Potentate and First Lady of Mazol Shriners of Newfoundland and Labrador. Thank you to everyone who has joined us to celebrate this very special event.

It's been a long journey getting to this point, from the first time Ill. Sir Den Billard and I talked about our philanthropy, while sipping a beer after one of our many snow blowing episodes during the Winter of 2012. To the time Ill. Sir Rolly Card asked me if I would consider joining the Mazol Divan. I had only been a member of Mazol for a year or so, and am somewhat ashamed to say I had no familiarity with what a Divan actually did. I'll guarantee you that that's definitely no longer the case.

What a ride it has been, and how wonderful it has been to experience the warmth and friendship of the Nobility not only across this great Province, but throughout North America. It's amazing, wherever Shriners gather, it's always an uplifting event. Sharon and I greatly value the numerous relationships we have established. Being a Shrine couple has brought a whole new dimension to our lives and introduced us to a new purpose to which I can assure you we are both fully committed.

Looking ahead to 2018, I believe from a doing business perspective, Mazol needs to maintain the momentum started at the Meeting of the Clubs in November in Gander. This was a very significant event at which many issues were discussed, issues were clarified and recommendations were made which will be the fundamental basis of a going forward strategy for our Divan and Nobility. Please take the time to read the report on this meeting entitled "What was Heard". It's a great synopsis, which was compiled by our new High Priest and Prophet, Noble Brian Peckford.

We've all heard the membership message and Mazol is indeed fortunate to have a young person like Noble Brandon Pike leading our charge on this front. There are exciting things in the works this year and I urge all of you to do your part in identifying potential new members and bringing them into our Temple.

Another ongoing priority will be transparency and communication. I wish I had a dollar for every time I've heard these two words stressed in my interactions with Nobles over the past five years on the Divan. While the best of intentions and efforts have been focused on improving transparency and communication, we continue to hear that we need to do it better. My Divan will focus on improving this vital area in the months to come.

In another area, we have to start re-examining how we raise funds. The traditional ways of the past may not be the best going forward. Our bingos are dealing with declining sales, and we only have to revisit our Fezeroo disaster from the past year for a real wake-up call. I believe we have taken the correct step this weekend by recommending the formation of a committee of the Clubs to provide direction to our fundraising across the Island and in Labrador.

One of the major questions coming out of our Gander Meeting had to do with the Mazol Shrine Centre. It was apparent that there were misconceptions out there that needed to be addressed, and they were addressed to the satisfaction of those posing the questions. The MSC has undergone a major operational change over the past few months and is now poised to become a significant contributor to the overall operations of Mazol.

Finally, I'd like to touch on the terrific asset we are so fortunate to have been given by Harold Duffett a number of years ago. [The Shriner's RV Park in Eastport](#) is truly the jewel in the crown of our organization. Through the hard work of a dedicated Board overseen by the Charitable Trust chaired by Ill. Sir John Brake, the Park has now reached the point where it also can start making a significant contribution to the PTF and the Temple.

Earlier today our Ladies were learning about Lady Sharon's special charity for 2018. It will be dedicated to enabling families to better cope with Osteogenesis Imperfecta, or O.I. Commonly referred to as "Brittle Bone Disease". The Montreal Hospital is presently developing a project that will provide OI families with an ultra-specialized first aid kit that will allow the parents to stabilize fractures in their children at home. Donations collected by Lady Sharon this year will be dedicated to this most worthy project. For your information you will soon be able to view Sharon's video presentation from this morning and speech on the Mazol Webpage.

In closing, It is my sincere hope that 2018 will be a fun and positive year for Mazol. Should we all work in harmony and with brotherly love we can accomplish many things for our Temple. Mazol belongs to you, the Nobles, and only you can make the year 2018 a great and successful year.





Our Patient Stories

Carter Churchill

Carter has been a Shrine patient since 2012. The smile you see on his face never changes! Once you discover Carter's strengths and charismatic demeanor, you cannot feel more than proud to be a Mazol Shriner! As Kimberly Churchill said so eloquently, "Mazol became a bright light in a very dark time".

In the words of Dr. Felice Leonardo Buscaglia, "Too often we underestimate the power of a touch, a smile, a kind word, a listening ear, an honest compliment, or the smallest act of caring... all of which have the potential to turn a life around".

Thank you Kimberly and Carter for being part of our special night.



Your little boy is really sick right now...We have to take it hour by hour." The Doctor said. He continued, "Although this condition is not rare, it is not common, and babies die from complications like this and there is no guarantee that there will be a happy end here." ...Hours earlier I had an emergency c-section due to the fact there was no blood being pumped from the baby's heart.

At that very moment my life was changing...I just didn't realize how much.

Carter Reed Churchill was born 4 weeks early with undeveloped lungs, low blood sugars, an

enlarged heart, enlarged liver, three brain bleeds, circulation problems and critically low blood pressure. He was hooked up to a web of cords, tubing, masks, and leads with each having its own critical job to perform. Over the coming weeks there would be numerous medical tests, EEG, EKG, MRI and X-Rays. I remember it was the first X-Ray that we discovered his heart was the size of his lungs and his liver was the size of his stomach. I also remember the overwhelming need to hear him cry! Due to his inability to breathe, a tube placed was placed in his throat which had to go thru his vocal cord...how easily we can take the simple things like wanting to hear your baby cry for granted.

As a parent it is extremely difficult watching your child suffer thru anything, most times we can kiss the boo boos and make it all better, in our case we knew that would never work. A feeling of helplessness consumed us as we watched our baby Carter lie in the NICU day after day, week after week.

It's interesting how quickly you gain new perspective on life when you are faced with such a horrific set of circumstances. The words... "and babies die from complications like this" will forever be with me....and not to haunt me but to remind me of where we once were. As eventually, the catheter was removed, the breathing tube was taken away, the sugar regulated, the blood pressure stabilized, and the leads lifted from his chest ...we were finally able to take our baby home...we were finally able to go enjoy life and do what all families do! We thought that the worse was behind us, however...

On May 16, at 3 months old, Carter was diagnosed with a profound hearing loss...to put that into context, his hearing level was equivalent to that of a jet engine. To say we were shocked would be an understatement. We were never given any indication that there may be an issue, however, looking back on it, it could explain why he cried every day...which by the way, I did try really hard, to remind myself how grateful I was to hear it!



We were told we had a choice: to have Cochlear Implant surgery and learn speech or do nothing and communicate with I think it was at that very moment I realized for the first time that our decision as Parents will have a direct and lifelong impact on our child...it was an enormous decision that weighed very heavy upon us. Ultimately, after much research and discussions, we opted for CI surgery.

At 11 months old, after suspecting that Carter was not developing his motor skills as his older brother Hunter had, we were told that Carter likely has cerebral palsy. They said likely because there isn't a procedure available that you can test for CP... it's basically a diagnosis that comes about after several other possibilities are ruled out and CP is most likely based on signs and symptoms. That was hard to accept, as we would have preferred a much more definitive diagnosis.

Almost a year later, here we were, feeling helpless yet again...and I, I was needing hope.

No one ever expects nor can prepare themselves for these kind of life changes. Yet, every life involves challenges - some are huge and almost insurmountable and if we want any hope of flourishing, and that's what we want, then when we are confronted with these challenges we want to seize any amount of hope there is to get us through.

What is hope?

Is it the promise of something new or different...Something never tried...something better perhaps...an opportunity for positive change...a chance at a dream that may come true...?

For our family...for Carter...the Mazol Shriners became a bright light in a very dark time. With them came new opportunity, new promise, and yes - hope.

My husband Todd was approached by Paul Reid, one of his colleagues that suggested that Shriners might be able to help Carter; Paul was a Director. When the Mazol Shriners reached out to tell us that they could help, that they could support us and could make things a little easier for us... that became another life changing moment.

In August 2012 Carter made his first trip to Montreal to attend a clinic at the Shriners Hospital. It was unlike any other experience we have ever had. During our visit we seen Occupational Therapists, Physiotherapists, Nurses, and the renowned Dr. Benaroch. The feeling of excitement and hope was overflowing. We wanted more information and a clearer picture of Carter's diagnosis but most importantly we wanted to know what was in store for him...hope.

Although it would take a couple more visits and for Carter to grow and become older before Dr. Benaroch was able to give us a detailed picture, he was able to provide us with more insight and educate us on what possibilities existed for Carter. He gave us hope of something more, something never tried, something better, an opportunity to try something new and different.

Carter has been a Shriners patient for more than 5 years and we can say with certainty that without Shriners' medical care Carter wouldn't be able to stand flat on two feet, he wouldn't be able to use his walker without pain, he wouldn't be able to kick a ball with ease and comfort. Shriners arranged through J.E Hanger for Carter to receive custom moulded articulated ankle-foot orthotics with a special rubber liner that not only was considerably more comfortable for him but provided for the first time a measure of mobility by allowing movement in one direction. Previously AFOs were rigid and offered no movement in any direction.

Not only has Shriners given Carter much more opportunity for a better living mobility wise, we were also given something else that was truly priceless...peace of mind. To know we as a family like so many other families, who are already struggling with high cost of medical equipment, do not have to incur the additional burden associated with costs of flights, accommodations, treatments, specialists, exams, tests, AFO's, I could go on. Our family recognizes that without Shriners, without the medical staff, all of the loyal, selfless and caring volunteers, Carter would not be able to have the experiences and growth he has had. For this we are truly grateful. There is no greater satisfaction in life than to help ensure that a child reaches his or her full potential.



Over the course of the last 5 years we have met and made friends with THE most incredible group of volunteers I have ever seen. In my opinion, they are a class above the rest...and simply irreplaceable. These volunteers who have given up so much of their time away from friends, family, work and even holidays make this organization who it is today. It is your dedication, professionalism, compassion and perseverance that defines and shapes The Mazol Shriners. This is displayed each and every time a volunteer has the willingness to go over and above what is expected, or to make themselves available – sometimes at a moments notice – to aid in strengthening programs and services. We recognize and appreciate that you make many sacrifices to do your job.

You have given the greatest gift a person can give – time.

On a night of celebrations, we want to say thank you. Thank you for your endless support and for being there for us when we needed you.

There is nothing like being in a room full of people who through their thoughts and their acts together believe that they can do something that can change another person's life and hereby changing the world...and indeed this is exactly what you have done.



In closing, I would like to quote St. Francis of Assisi:

“Remember that when you leave this earth, you can take with you nothing that you have received - only what you have given: a full heart, enriched by honest service, love, sacrifice and courage.”

Where Healing Meets Happiness

Helping families of children with Osteogenesis Imperfecta (OI) to bring a little bit of our hospital home

Osteogenesis Imperfecta. (OI).....Before Paul became a Shriner, I had not even heard of this disease. Also known as “brittle bone disease”, it is a genetic bone disorder characterized by fragile bones that break very easily. A child born with this devastating and painful disorder is affected throughout his or her life time. There is no cure!

Our Exceptional patient, and truly a fantastic fundraiser in his own right, Carter Brown, and his mother Jennifer, continue to inspire other patients, families, and the community to rise up and change the lives of those affected with OI. In March Shriners Hospital for Children Canada officially launched a project that will provide OI families with an ultra-specialized first aid kit that will allow the parents to stabilize fractures in their children at home.

Often parents don't have immediate access to a doctor or hospital when a fracture occurs. Parents need to have the tools to stabilize their child's fracture and ease their pain, until they are able to get to the hospital. You can read about this new project on the Montreal Hospital website and their Facebook page.

Many of you have heard of Carter Brown as one of our Canadian Hospital Ambassadors, and some of you have even met him.

I had the pleasure of meeting Carter and I have been so inspired not only by Carter and his family, but by the strength of all our OI patients who fight every day to live a full and safe life.



As First Lady of Mazol for 2018, I have made it my goal to help provide our OI families with an ultra-specialized first aid home kit. The Montreal hospital is aiming to raise \$30,000.00. I would like to be able to show all the Canadian Temples that Mazol can and will step up to the challenge.

I am very excited to announce that donations have already been received for my special charity for 2018. A huge thank you goes out to The Compass Shrine Club, the St. John's Shrine Club, and the Ladies of the Sabre for their generous donations of \$1,000.00 each; and to the St. Andrews Lodge, Ladies Auxiliary for their kind donation of \$100.00.

The next time your Club is holding a fundraiser, may it be an afternoon tea, bake sale, a craft fair, card game, etc., I sincerely ask that you consider donating some of the proceeds from your fundraisers to my special project this year.




