Brandon is a young boy, just starting his teenage years at the tender age of 13. He has been a Shriner's Patient from St. John's, since he was four years old, and over the last nine years he has grown into a strong young man with a zest for life and musical talent to boot. The following is a description of Brandon's journey with the Shriner's, as told by Brandon himself, in a speech he gave at the Mazol Shrine Summer Ceremonial Banquet this past July...



Good evening everybody, I would like to thank the Shriners for having me as a special guest here tonight.

My name is Brandon Bowen and I'm 13 years old. Some people say that I am a miracle baby. When I was born, I was only 2 pounds and 4 ounces – just like a block of butter!! I was born 3 months premature and I spent 4 ½ months in the NICU before I got to go home with my Mom and Dad. I was diagnosed with Cerebral Palsy when I was 16 months old. With my disability, I mostly struggle with my gross motor skills, like walking.

When I was about 2 years old, and trying to learn to walk, my legs used to do what is called "scissoring", which means that they would cross over each other, and it made it very hard to walk. I tried some Botox treatments in my legs, which seemed to work at first to keep my legs from scissoring, but this would only last for a short period of time.

My Doctor spoke to my parents about contacting the Shriners hospital, and how we should see if there was something that they could do to help me fix my legs.

It was about 9 years ago when I travelled to Gander to meet with the team from Montreal to see if I would be a candidate for the Rhizotomy surgery. After meeting with the team from Montreal, they told me that I was a candidate to have this surgery. It wasn't long when my parents received a call from Montreal telling us that the surgery will take place in June. When I arrived, the Shriners met me with open arms.

As part of having the surgery, the staff at the hospital went over everything with me that was involved in the surgery, and all the different stages that would take place before and after the surgery. They were super, super nice. They made us feel like we were family. After surgery, I spent 7 weeks doing intensive physiotherapy. I even got to ride around the hospital on a paddle bike, which was pretty awesome. The Physiotherapist and Occupational Therapist were very nice. They always made me smile and laugh, even on those bad days when I was in a lot of pain.

Every day after I was finished my physio, I loved going to the playroom. The staff in the playroom were so nice. They had some cool toys there to play with, which helped me forget about any pain that I was having.

They would have volunteers come in to help out. I got to meet one of the volunteers. He was a student going to a school close by. We had a blast hanging out in the playroom. I even let my Mom and Dad go on a date while I was hanging out with him. We became good friends. He would even come back to see me when I used to go back to Montreal for appointments.

I hope the hospital continues to have volunteers come in and hang out with the kids as this really helped me forget why I was really there, in the first place.

After the year from my Rhizotomy surgery, I was zooming around in my walker. I never had used my wheelchair very often. Unfortunately, I took a growing spurt and I started to have issues, which required multiple surgeries over





the past few years.

I'm really hoping someday to get back on my feet again. Who knows, with the technology always improving, and lots of research being done with the help of the Shriners – there could be a cure for Cerebral Palsy someday?

I would like to thank everyone here tonight for all your support, and it's people like you who help kids like me. Now I would like to share with you some of my musical talent – I can play the button accordion. I've been playing for almost 4 years. I've been busying playing in different festivals and charity events.

Harold W. Duffett Shriners RV Park The story behind the park.

The Harold W. Duffett Shriners RV Park ("The Park") is in Eastport, on the beautiful "Road to the Beaches". This area is a well-established Newfoundland and Labrador tourist area with two excellent sandy beaches and small fishing communities that are a photographer's dream. The Park consists of 150 trailer sites, with a range of sites that can accommodate a full range of larger motor homes to the pop-up trailers. The Park can accommodate both seasonal and transient campers and it provides a good level of service for these RV travelers.



When compared to other Shrine temples, Mazol Temple in Newfoundland and Labrador, is in a unique position as it owns and operates an RV park. To fully understand the benefit of this park to the Mazol Temple, a brief history is given.

The Park, originally known as "Eastport Peninsula Sunshine Park", was opened in 1972. In 1975, Noble Harold W. Duffett purchased The Park and with the help of his employees, opened The Park in June 1975 and operated from June 24th to the Labour Day weekend each year.

Many Mazol Shriners enjoyed The Park, led by Ill. Sir Ed Janes, Potentate in 1985, who had business interests on the Eastport Peninsula, as owner of the P. Janes and Sons fish plant at Salvage.

In 1979, Ill. Sir Janes wanted his Shriner RV friends to be able to have a longer season in The Park, from the May 24th weekend to the Thanksgiving weekend. This resulted in an agreement with Noble Harold Duffett for the Mazol RV Unit ("The RV Unit") to operate The Park for \$1.00 per year. Later, this led to, in 1983, a formal lease agreement for 10 years, with a renewal for another 10 years, between Noble Harold Duffett's Holding Company and the Mazol Temple Holding Corporation for the similar charge of \$1.00 per year.

The RV Unit continued to operate The Park during the lease period. With the end of the 20-year lease approaching, Ill. Sir John H Brake, Potentate for 2006, held discussions with Noble Harold Duffett about the future of The Park. It was decided by the Duffett Family that the time had arrived, and The Park's ownership was gifted to the Mazol Shriners Charitable Trust Inc. ("The Trust").

In 2006, under the new ownership of Mazol Shriners, The Park continued to be operated as a commercial operation. Mazol Shriners set up The Trust, as directed by Noble Harold Duffett in the transfer agreement. While The Trust had direct responsibility for the oversight of The Park, it delegated the day to day operation to The RV Unit. Also, in 2007, the name of The Park was changed to the Harold W. Duffett Shriners RV Park to recognize the generous gift from its benefactor.

In 2006, The Park was thirty-four (34) years old and contained much of the original infrastructure. During the time that The RV Unit managed The Park under the lease, many projects were successfully completed. An excerpt from a July 2009 Business Plan, authored by Ill Sir John Brake, chair of The Trust, gave a description of these upgrades. As far as can be determined, this 2009 Business Plan was completed when applying for funds from ACOA to expand The Park. The excerpt reads as follows;



"upgrading of the electrical system; the construction and furnishing of a modern kitchen in the recreation center; a new games room for children, erected and maintained; mini golf and shuffle board units installed; a new playground area developed; a fire pit constructed; the walking trail upgraded and new bridges erected; the artesian well system overhauled and new pumps and tanks installed; the front office was extended and wash rooms provided; number two cabin was completed and furnished; the recreation building had plumbing installed together with new sound system, a new ceiling and a new floor; all the trailer sites were improved and others constructed."

Also, in this 2009 Business Plan, the following statement occurred.

"The purpose of Mazol Shriners leasing the Park in the beginning and subsequently acquiring ownership, was twofold, firstly to provide a home base and RV meeting place for the Shriners Family and secondly to generate funds for the Shriners Patient Transportation Fund. Over the years, the park has certainly established itself as a home base for the Shriners Families RV Unit and has expanded beyond the Shriners Families to serve all RV users and the general public. It has contributed approximately \$200,000 to the Shriners Patient Transportation Fund during that time. Future budgeted surplus funds will be contributed to the Patient Transportation Fund in accordance with the overall objectives of the "not for profit organization". Over the 20 years history as a Shriners Park, the Park has undergone many upgrades, as RV Shrine Unit members worked hard to enhance the beauty and standards of the facility. The RV Committee for the park have now recommended a major upgrading of the park's facilities to include upgrading washrooms and laundry facilities, electrical services and water and sewage services, as well as upgrading existing, un-serviced sites to a suitable standard for seasonal camping."

The application for a loan to ACOA was successful and along with an investment from Mazol Shriners Patient Transportation Fund ("PTF"), The Park was able to construct 37 new larger fully serviced sites in 2009-10.

Since 2006, in addition to the major upgrade of 37 larger fully serviced sites referenced above, there have been other significant upgrades and improvements to The Park, which have been financed from operations. Most notable of these: develop a further 12 larger fully serviced sites; upgraded water pumping station; upgrade several older 30 amp sites to 50 amp; purchase a small backhoe; complete a major upgrade of the original electricity supply to The Park; purchase and use of a computerized reservation system; upgrading of the recreation building; installation of a Wi-Fi system for patron access to the internet; upgrading of website; installation of a new shuffleboard; purchase new chairs and tables for the recreation hall and many other smaller projects.



As stated above, in 2006, The Trust commenced overall responsible for the Park. The first Chair of The Trust was Ill. Sir John Brake and he has continued to be the Chair until the present. Other members of The Trust Board have been: The Divan of the day; Noble Harold Duffett, a lifetime member; and other Nobles, as appointed by the Divan of the day, who have knowledge in managing an RV park.

Since 2008, the asset value of The Park

has been significantly increased, and in 2018 the ACOA loan (interest free) along with the investment from the PTF (plus interest) were fully repaid. The Park has received many donations from other Mazol Shrine Clubs, especially the Gander Shrine Club who gave donations for a new comfort station and laundry building and refurbishing funds for the recreation center and office. Individuals also gave donations and there have been many fund-raising events for the PTF held in the Park and surrounding communities. Yearly park revenues have significantly increased while operating costs have decreased. In addition, The Park has supported the surrounding communities by purchasing what supplies and services it can, locally. Most recently, The Park has started to work more closely with the local tourist association to attract more tourists to the area.

None of the above, either during the leasing or ownership, would have been possible without the hard and dedicated work and assistance of Mazol Shriners. In the earlier days, the number of Nobles directly involved in the RV Park were probably more than forty, while today it is down to seven. During these periods, there was always a Board of Directors in place which guided the growth of the Park. Current President, Noble Kevin Butt, previous President, Ill. Sir Bert Avery, and all the previous Presidents have all helped guide The Park to where it is today, and they are to be commended. Until 2018, The Park was managed by Shriners. Noble Peter Seaward and Lady Dorothy managed during most of the leasing and part of the ownership period. Then more recently, Noble David Cook managed The Park for the remainder of the ownership period up to 2018. These Nobles and Lady are to be also commended for their hard and dedicated work. In 2018, as stated above, a change was made by selecting a non-shrine affiliated husband and wife team, Wayne and Paula Cross of Eastport. We are sure that with their guidance, The Park will have another successful year.

The Park Ladies Auxiliary has also played an intricate role in the ongoing success of The Park. Their constant support along with their fundraising activities has successfully resulted in the addition of most of the recreation assets in The Park.



The Park is currently at a bit of a crossroad. The upgraded sections of The Park are modern and offers good amenities to its patrons. However, there remains upgrading requirements for half of the original section of The Park. Another concern is the demographics of its customer base. In general, the customer base is one of an aging population with few young families and their kids. Along with this, the RV industry is currently going through a challenging time. If The Park is to maintain or increase its customer base, new recreational facilities will have to be installed to attract a younger clientele. Also, the RV Park will have to become more aggressive in its marketing activities. Some steps are underway, but more will have to be done.

Overall, the story of The Park is a great success story. It is a testament to what can be achieved when a group of dedicated people, the Nobles and Ladies of Mazol Shrine, strive towards a common goal. In this case, the common goal is to raise money through the commercial operation of The Park for the care and treatment of Newfoundland and Labrador Shrine Kids. As was stated above, significant funds were given to the PTF when it was leased. Since becoming the owners of the RV Park, much money had to be invested in upgrading and expansion. With The Park now being debt free, starting in 2017 and each successive year, money can again flow to the PTF, even after the necessary money for operations, modest upgrading and marketing is accounted for.

Finally, it should be recognised that our seasonal patrons are taking an active role in organizing activities in the park, such as; music, shuffle board, quilting, darts and cards as well as a bike ride. During the year, they also organize Pot Luck Dinners and dances. They have also been very successful in raising funds for the PTF.

Some Thoughts on Being a Shriner and Ensuring Ongoing Success

As Shriners, we know that our prime objective is to continually raise, day after day, year after year, hopefully forever, the monies needed to support our own local Mazol Temple Patient Travel Fund and our Canadian Hospital in Montreal. We are able to do this because our hearts and willpower are constantly reinvigorated by the children we serve and the smiling results on their faces when their bodies are blessed with the very special care they receive from the many hospitals under the banner of Shriners International.

Like every organization that draws many types of personalities, with many types of skills and life experiences, we don't always agree with everything that goes on within the workings of our organization under the umbrella of the Mazol Temple and the guidance of our Illustrious Potentate and Divan. Why is this?

When I started my first year at Memorial University (MUN) in 1968, I wanted to get a high enough average grade, for all my courses, that would qualify me for entering the first graduate Engineering program at MUN which began in the fall of 1969. I chose English Literature and Political Science as two of my courses thinking they would be easier than the other courses I had to take like, Physics, Chemistry and Math. They were not easier of course but they taught me a few things. My English teacher was non-other than Ted Russell himself. My home town is now Gander NL (grew up in Portugal Cove, NL moved to Gander 1971 to teach at the Community College. Retired from there in 1991). I am a member of the Gander Shrine Club and holds the position of Patient Co-ordinator and Mazol Shriners holding the position of Patient Chairman.

In 1983 I joined Airways Masonic Lodge in Gander with the prime intention of becoming a Shriner. I became a Shriner at the summer Ceremonial of 1985 in Gander, NL (Dr. Gerald Hewitt from Gander was the Potentate). I took on the position of Gander Club Patient Co-ordinator in the late 90s and became Mazol Patient Chairman in 2006?

Why did you become a Shriner?



I had heard a lot about the wonderful work that Shriners did for children with Orthopaedic & Burn conditions. Joining Shriners for me was a way in which I could payback for help I received which has given me the opportunity to enjoy some of the good things in my life. Now as Mazol Patient Chairman, I always feel empathy for the young patients I have the honour & privilege to work with.

Payback for me goes back to my childhood when I was a young boy around 11 years old and was stricken with what was believed to be "Spinal Tuberculoses". With that diagnosis I received the devastating news, I was to spend the rest of my life in a wheel chair. However, I was fortunate enough that through the training and dedication of a nurse, she happened to notice there was something different about my case. She summoned the Orthopedic Surgeon who made a more extensive examination and realized that it was not "Spinal Tuberculoses" but it was "Spinal Cord Trauma" due to inflammatory arthritics of the lower spine. After several months in hospital with physiotherapy and medication and physiotherapy at home as well, I was able to return to school to finish my sixth grade.

For me, during the past 12 years as Mazol Patient Chairman as well as Gander Club Patient coordinator, I feel so blessed & fortunate to meet the many young "Heroes", who have become

our patients. I've met and made friends with grateful parents and caregivers who face the world every day with such a positive outlook and the children's smiles despite their pain all because Shriners were able to help.

For each Clinic held at JPM, the great feeling of hope for the children begins when I pick up Dr. Francois Fassier at the airport, which I've done for every clinic held. In coordinating & assisting at the Outreach Clinic, I am so proud that I can in some small way give a little back and possibly a lot forward to the young people who strive daily to be all they can be.



In recognizing patients from many areas in NL was having to travel to either St. John's or Montreal were being stressed. In 2003 it was decided maybe a central location was needed to have an Outreach Clinic from Montreal Shriners hospital. I was able to arrange consultation between Mazol Patient Chairman and the administration JPM hospital, Gander. From that an agreement was reached with no difficulty to begin the process. I was glad to have played a role towards making this happen. In the spring of 2004 the first clinic was held with Dr. Francois Fassier, his clinical assistant and Shriner representation present and has continued since. That was a proud time for me with the hope many NL children needing the help we could possibly provide would be seen and taken care of. Since then, to date over 300 patients has been seen by Dr. Fassier and his clinical assistants. This has been resulted in much less stress and anxiety to the many patients and families in NL.

What is your proudest moment of being a Shriner?

There are so many that there's no special one that I can say stands out above others. From 2004 – present time being involved with the Outreach Clinic there has been many proud moments on my journey as a Shriner. Time spent with patients and families, many looking for hope and support to make life better for the children has been satisfying, fulfilling and gratifying.

• One of the first patients I assisted was a young boy about 2 years old. When I first met him and his mother he was crawling on the floor, could not walk. I was told by his mother he had a brace on his leg but she had been advised he would never be able to walk without one. His parents had little hope for anything more so one more try was to contact "Shriners", He was immediately accepted as a Shrine patient this was followed with many surgeries at Shriners

Hospital, Montreal. After 12 years or more being cared for by the wonderful Shriners doctors he visited the Outreach Clinic in Gander and was again seen by Dr. Fassier. After a short time along with his mom seeing Dr. Fassier he left the examining room, took his brace and threw it down the corridor saying Give this to somebody who needs it, "I don't need it any more". That was a moment I'll never forget feeling so proud I was able to travel this journey with him and see the positive results that came from it.

• Another story of a young boy's parents who came to me wondering if there was anything that could be done for their son who was born with no external ears. He was having a lot of difficulty socially, especially in school. I was able to connect them with a Shriners Hospital who did some marvelous work by arranging for cosmetic techniques and the use of implants.

This greatly improved not only his hearing but his self esteem and increased his social well being and confidence.

- Some patients have come to us unable to communicate and in a wheelchair. One patient (teens now) is now able to walk very well on his own and is able to express himself much better. Recently, visiting the Outreach Clinic, walked up to me with arms outstretched for a big hug. Now that's a time when I felt very proud to be a Shriner.
- A mother contacted me about her little girl who had brittle bone disease (Osteogenesis imperfecta). She was very stressed about the child as the child had just gone through some surgery and in the process her pelvis was fractured. Needless to say myself and my wife took this to heart and every effort was made to see if Shriners could help. After many visits and specialized treatments and procedures at



Montreal Shriners hospital she was able to carry on with a much better and more normal active life. This is only one of the many with this condition who have been able to access the help of Shriners.

• Others not connected to the Outreach Clinic has been related to a couple of cases re spinal cord injury. From that I was able to make contact to set the wheels in motion resulting in the patients being transported to one of our Spinal Cord specialty hospitals. I have received messages of the amazing help and treatment the patients along with the families received there. Personal thanks came from a young patient who spent some time receiving care. This again made me proud to be a Shriner helping those who were in desperate need.

There are many, many more stories from my experiences with Shrine patients and the Outreach Clinic. I have heard many stories of misdiagnosis, prolonged treatments, etc. with parents feeling of confusion and helplessness for their children. Shriners became their road to hope and help for a better life for the children – our children. In many of the visits with families who are seeking our help I have been assisted by my wife. This lends to a better atmosphere for the family being able to relate vs just a Shriner. It's the family/team approach.

The parents' stories tells of the many caring and specialized staff at Shriners hospitals with many positive results and stories. They have the highest praise for the Shriners doctors and medical supports at all Shriners hospitals. Yes, I am proud to be a Shriner!

A Footnote:

Being present at the dedication & opening of the New Shriners Children's Hospital in Montreal in 2015 and to realize this was through the work of the many Shriners was a very notable time for me. No doubt, this was going to provide a top notch service to our patients who would be treated there.

Also, in January of 2018 during the Public Installation ceremony of Ill Sir Paul Rose and his Divan I was honoured to be the recipient of an Emeritus Award for my 10 years of continued service as Mazol Patient Chair.

Shrinedom has been a very rewarding experience for me. This is realized when people come to me and say how much they appreciate the work we Shriners do. They tell the wonderful stories of children who have been helped by the Shriners Hospitals in Canada & the US, they tell you of how much a difference we make for struggling families with young children who have disabling childhood diseases/conditions and of how they depend on us to help them cope with this every day. They tell you of how things might have been better for some people if Shriners had been around many years gone by. I know exactly what they mean!

The 2018 Imperial Session of Shriners International (Imperial) was held at Daytona Beach, FL from Friday, July 13 to Thursday, July 19, 2018. Opportunity often comes disguised as another's misfortune, the means that saw Lady Cheryl's and my attendance to the Imperial. Ill Sir Paul was prevented from flying due to medical reasons and I had the pleasure of attending in his absence. Many Nobles don't realize Shriners International (SI) send (and when I say send I mean cover the expenses to travel to the Imperial) representatives from all temples, the number of registered delegates permitted to attend is based on the number of Nobles in the temple, Mazol is permitted to send two delegates and their ladies. Mazol's delegates, in addition to Lady Cheryl and I included the Chief Rabban Robert Barrett and Lady Zana. The Oriental Guide Robert Tucker and Lady Sandi attended at their own expense, albeit they stayed with Lady Cheryl and I and that certainly added to the positive experience we shared.

The Imperial is certainly not a holiday, most days begin by 6am with breakfast, business sessions and other events throughout the day, usually concluding late in the evening. But that being said, there were networking opportunities, the massive parade, patient stories, Imperial Divan interactions, patient ambassador appearances, and other events that made the time fly, and rejuvenated your energy levels as well as reinforce why we do what we do.

The business sessions saw many resolutions debated, many involved the restructuring of the hospitals. Shriners Hospital for Children (SHC) could easily from a practical side, operate from one current location, however this is definitely not the direction SI is proceeding. We have hospitals that have less than one inpatient per day, yet it costs \$millions to operate, so obviously changes have to be made. One chart shown illustrated the shift from inpatient visits to outpatient. In 1968 there were over 350,00 inpatient visits, just over 50,000 outpatient visits, in 2017 the exact opposite was true, approximately 350,000 outpatient visits compared to just over 50,000 inpatient visits. This is the future and we are becoming a product of our own success. Much of the shift is directly related to the tremendous research program by SHC, and how technology have greatly reduced the need for extended inpatient stays.

Another enlightening discussion was regarding SI's marketing campaigns. On many occasions I have heard of the massive expenses by SI towards activities such golf tournaments, NASCAR, and football. SI commissioned the international firm Nielsen to compare the net cost of marketing to total value. The SI College Classic has a \$0.06 net expense for each \$1 earned, NASCAR is \$0.16 net per \$1 earned, East West Shrine Game \$0.26, a nd SI marketing in general \$0.48 net expense for each \$1 value earned. SI held 32 football games in 2017, net proceeds were \$667,957 (\$487,422 towards SHC, \$180,535 PTF), 67 golf tournaments were held in 2017 with net proceeds of \$914,275 (\$729,825 SHC, \$184,450 PTF), as well as other events such as El Zaribah Bowling (Phoenix) - \$103,398 , Zamora Horse Show (Birmingham) - \$48,178, Morocco Rodeo (Jacksonville) - \$38,762 , Melha Poker Run (Springfield) \$22,952 , and Acca Walk for Love (Richmond) - \$20,903.

It was a nice touch to see the SHC NASCAR, and to meet driver Noble David Ragan.

Another very successful marketing campaign undertaken by SI was "Adventures with Alec" former SHC Patient Ambassador. This campaign yielded \$246,904 total value.



As is discussed at every Mazol meeting, so too was membership discussed at length. There were many new temples approved, all from areas like Bolivia. SI membership statistics 2017 included: creations 6,569, affiliations 966, restorations 2,451, demits 2,199, deaths 9,175, suspensions 9,741, exp/ resignations 358, for a net loss of 11,500, which is 1,183 less than 2016, but everyone should recognize while it is an improvement from 2016 it is nothing to be proud of, Shriners International still lost 1,183 Nobles. Jim Cain of Nashville, Tennessee, was elected Imperial Potentate. Imperial Sir gave a very empowering, yet very humble acceptance speech, Jim is what Shriners is all about! Mark Hartz was elected as the new kid on the block – the Imperial Outer Guard. The election of the Imperial Divan wasn't without controversy, in fact the speeches, those who rose on personal privileges, certainly added to the flavour of the Imperial. Two past Imperial Potentates ran for elected office, one being Imperial Recorder but both were unsuccessful.





Other highlights of Imperial included the Ladies Luncheon with special guest Kechi, who also performed several selections at the church service. Pictured here is the Mazol delegation with this famous Shriner patient and America's Got Talent Finalist.

Another highlight was the parade, which saw two hours of continuous entertainment by various temples, and it was loved by everyone, Shriners, Imperial Officers and the public, but most of all the children present were ecstatic.



But the entertainment highlight of the Imperial Session was the evening of entertainment provided by the Oak Ridge Boys! An amazing concert, attended by all Nobles and the Imperial Divan. Even more moving was when the Oak Ridge Boys called all the SHC patients on stage while they performed.

The most famous Oak Ridge Boy, William L. Golden became a Shriner after the concert! Seen here is Imperial Sir Gary Bergenske and incoming Imperial Potentate Jim Cain.

Another lifelong memory was meeting the National Patient Ambassadors for SHC Lily and Riley.

This is what we are about, no actually this is what we should be about, this should be why we exist as Nobles. The Imperial Session 2018 was a tremendous experience, it allows delegates to have a say regarding how the Iowa and Colorado Corporations function, how SI and SHC run, but most of all it reenergizes everyone present and I highly encourage all Nobles to experience it at least once in your Shrine life. 
