Mazol's Potentate 2021 III Sir Gerald W. Budden

I would first like to take the opportunity to thank the Nobility of Mazol Shriners for the confidence that they have placed in me by electing me as potentate for 2021.

I was very pleased with the turnout for my installation on January 16th and from all accounts it appeared that everyone enjoyed themselves and although Covid regulations restricted the numbers that could attend and the wearing of masks is somewhat uncomfortable, we all managed to enjoy the festivities and the social interactions, it was indeed a great time. I am very fortunate in having a very strong and dedicated divan for my term of office, appointed committee members who are eager to serve, and a membership who wants to contribute to the overall success of our temple as shrine/masons.

As I write this article I am fully aware that the Covid pandemic that interfered with many of our activities of 2020 could easily play havoc with 2021.

Just checking the latest statistics today, we have now surpassed 23,000 deaths in Canada and 3.00 million deaths worldwide. There is no doubt in my mind that we have to be particular careful in all shrine activities and follow all the guidelines set by our Provincial Government and the Chief Medical Officer. It is also important that we comply with Grand Lodge and District Grand Lodge protocol when informed and I am confident that we will all play our part in this process as the safety of us all depends on each other during this pandemic.

I am hopeful however, that this year we can visit all our clubs, have a Summer Ceremonial and admit a number of our Masonic brethren to our ranks. Although it would be nice to visit other areas outside our province and attend the Imperial sessions in Houston, Texas our main priority is our own membership in Newfoundland and Labrador and even those visits will depend on how well we handle the ongoing pandemic.

One of my major goals for this year is to develop a strong fraternal connection between all members of our noble order. Unfortunately these past couple of years this was not the case and to much turmoil among our membership was quite evident, which resulted in actions that are uncommon in our fraternity but I believe with your help can be put behind us. Although I am sure that there are times that we may feel somewhat grieved by the comments or actions of others, we know that we are guided by the principle of turning the other cheek. It is NOT a question of who is right or who is wrong, it is a question of who is willing to forgive. It is not my purpose to lecture anyone, but to point out that as a brotherhood we have obligations to each other that we are duty bound to observe. As Masons and Shriners you know what they are, so I need not recite them.

Naturally, some will quote the bylaws referring to a Noble's right to take action if he feels that he has been wronged BUT those same bylaws state that before any proceedings or actions are taken that all efforts should be taken to avoid any other form of disciplinary action. As Peter said to the Lord, how often shall my brother sin against me and I forgive him? As many as seven times? I do not say to you seven times but seventy times seven. As Masons we hold in awe the wisdom of Solomon, one such sayings, is the Lord hates, HE that soweth discord among the brethren. So it is all in our own best interest not to sow that discord that creates confusion and disharmony among the membership. So Nobles, lets re-dedicate ourselves to the welfare of mutual respect and support for each other and to the fraternal interaction that makes us who we are and to what we belong, that being one of the greatest fraternities ever created.

Having said all of this I know that a small portion of our membership will not see it as I stated. Therefore, as an organization that requires its members to be Masons, I have to conclude by stating what was stated to you when you became a mason. In part, and I quote, "But if, unfortunately, your differences be of such a nature as not to be easily adjusted, it were better that one or both of you retire than that the harmony of the Lodge should be disturbed by your presence. ". Remember just because you have the power under the bylaws to lay a complaint against a fellow noble doesn't mean It's the Masonic correct thing to do.

Finally, brethren/nobles, I leave you with this quote, contributed to Bro. Joseph Newton, "Masonry is more than an institution, more than a tradition, more than a society, Masonry is one of the forms of Divine Life upon earth."

The Oriental Band

We sat down with Noble Walt Bennett, General Manager of Mazol's Oriental Band, to discuss what's happening with the Band.

The Oriental Band has been active for over 50 years. It presently operates under the direction of Noble Dave Bartlett, who succeeded his late father, Johnny Bartlett seven years ago.

The Band has 18 very active and dedicated members. In its early days the band was a drum and musette group. In latter years it has expanded its variety of percussion instruments, adding Quad Drums, and a xylophone ensemble, as well.

Of course, with the ongoing Pandemic the Band has been publicly inactive, but nonetheless continues to get together, when possible, to practice their repertoire of parade and ceremonial music.



It is noteworthy that two of Mazol's longest serving Shriners are Band members, namely Nobles Ted Mercer and Doug French. Ted will be 94 this year, and never misses a practice or social event. Doug, is probably our longest serving Shriner, with 54 years of engagement in the Temple, brings a wealth of experience, musical talent and energy to all Band activities.

The Band has until recently been a regular participant in St. John's Downtown Santa Claus Parade, and was recognized in 2017 by the City for 30 years of continuous parade involvement. Over the years the Band has also travelled throughout the Maritimes, Eastern Canada and the New England.

As previously mentioned the Band has 18 members, but is always interested in new members stepping forward to join their merry group, irrespective of musical talent. The group holds an annual flipper dinner as its major fundraiser, and has several social events with their Ladies throughout the year. MSC Report First Quarter 2021

So here we are. Where do we go from here? Just, where are we? How do we get them back? Will they want to come back? Where are they?

I joke about in the days when I was National President of Tourette Canada, I used to joke; "Where are they? Which way did they go? I must find them for I am their leader." This of course is a joke. They really haven't gone anywhere in fact some have been barely out of the house in a year. We know they want to come back. When we were looking to restart Bingo, we started with a plan that would keep everyone safe and feel comfortable. We had an excellent response. Our numbers of patrons steadily grew. More that half of the attendees were "new" people. When the Variant of Concern showed up, we shut down immediately. Since the lowering to Alert Level 2, the phone hasn't stopped ringing. When the number we are allowed increases to 100 from 50 we will restart again.

Prior to the last shutdown our bookings were picking up. We were fully engaged with Elections NL (St. John's West) and hosted the advanced polls and several training sessions for poll workers. We were going to have several polling stations on election day. Elections NL are honoring their commitment and we are being paid for everything that was booked. Welcome revenue.

Kudos to our Manager Sandy Moyles and Care Taker Tim Murphy under her direction our facility is getting know as the cleanest and best maintained in the City. We are getting very positive feedback. People are coming to the facility and feeling confident that they are safe.

In January we were the recipients of a \$10,000 grant to be spent to upgrade our handicapped washroom. That project is nearing completion. We have also been successful in procuring another \$10,000 grant toward operations.

Another government grant application was successful. This one is for \$2,000 and is designed to help seniors through the pandemic. We applied to have a Covid safe get together. We will host an event at the MSC for members that will include a meal, entertainment and fun activities maybe a few prizes. There will be more on this as plans are finalized. Bookings have taken off since the return to Alert Level 2. We are getting booked up for Summer and Fall. Let's hope we continue to make progress on battling back Covid so we can all get back together at your Shrine Centre. On behalf of your Board of Directors many thanks to our staff and supporters you are getting us through this. It is going to take time and a lot of work (& support) to help return us to the black.

Tuck-point Your Masonic Life

I've been thinking a lot lately about buildings. Their structural integrity, how sound they are; their state of repair and cost of maintenance. What it takes to maintain them.

Especially brick and stone buildings. After all, I work in a brick structure that is 80 years old. Tuck-pointing, I've learned, is "the process of removing old mortar from between bricks or stones and replacing it with new mortar,"

It is often done to walls of buildings that have begun to deteriorate, have become so worn by the elements that they no longer provide the protection and support for which they were erected. If ignored and allowed to deteriorate further, they can even become a danger to those in and around them.

As Masons, we are taught to use the tools of operative Masonry as the building blocks, with which we erect the "Temple of Souls," our Masonic character. In the First Degree we were presented with a 24-inch gauge and Common Gavel and taught to divide our time and divest ourselves of the vices and superfluities of life.

As a Fellowcraft, the plumb teaches us to walk uprightly before God and man; using the square to square our actions; and the Level to remind us that we are walking on that level of time to that undiscovered country from whose borne no traveler returns.

Finally, we were presented with the Master's especial tool, the trowel, and told that it is to be used to spread the cement of Brotherly love and friendship – that cement which binds the stones presented earlier in the structure of our Masonic character.

If you are a Master Mason – really and truly a Master Mason – you know that there is far more. Additional stones are presented in the lectures of the three Symbolic Degrees. Still more are quarried in the degrees and orders of the York Rite and the Scottish Rite. As we advance in Masonry, our inner structure, if properly attended to, rises statelier and magnificently.

As an operative building needs constant maintenance to keep it whole and sound, so does the structure of our Masonic character. But even with regular maintenance, an operative building will, over time, require some tuck-pointing. The same hold true for the structure of our Masonic character. We must maintain ourselves Masonically by continually participating in the degrees and practicing the truths they teach.

But, even then, a little Masonic tuck-pointing may become necessary.

By size comparison many of the Canadian temples are small by numbers in comparison to the US and other countries even collectively. There are approximately 350,000 Shriners with 10,000 being in Canada (less than 3% of the total).

Last year, I was approached to be a part of the new Board. With the blessing of the Divan, I was appointed an Advisor to the CAST Board. This group has been very busy since early last Fall, meeting two to three times per month. Activities of CAST are being noticed by Imperial. Canadian Temples now have a greater opportunity to bring concerns directly to the senior leaders of the Shrine.

Meet Noble Ralph Miller Mazol Hospital Chairman

My Name is Noble Ralph Miller. My home town is now Gander NL (grew up in Portugal Cove, NL moved to Gander 1971 to teach at the Community College. Retired from there in 1991). I am a member of the Gander Shrine Club and holds the position of Patient Co-ordinator and Mazol Shriners holding the position of Patient Chairman.



In 1983 I joined Airways Masonic Lodge in Gander with the prime intention of becoming a Shriner. I became a Shriner at the summer Ceremonial of 1985 in Gander, NL (Dr. Gerald Hewitt from Gander was the Potentate). I took on the position of Gander Club Patient Co-ordinator in the late 90s and became Mazol Patient Chairman in 2006?

I had heard a lot about the wonderful work that Shriners did for children with Orthopaedic & Burn conditions. Joining Shriners for me was a way in which I could payback for help I received which has given me the opportunity to enjoy some of the good things in my life. Now as Mazol Patient Chairman, I always feel empathy for the young patients I have the honour & privilege to work with.

Payback for me goes back to my childhood when I was a young boy around 11 years old and was stricken with what was believed to be "Spinal Tuberculosis". With that diagnosis I received the devastating news, I was to spend the rest of my life in a wheel chair. However, I was fortunate enough that through the training and dedication of a nurse, she happened to notice there was something different about my case. She summoned the Orthopedic Surgeon who made a more extensive examination and realized that it was not "Spinal Tuberculosis" but it was "Spinal Cord Trauma" due to inflammatory arthritics of the lower spine. After several months in hospital with physiotherapy and medication and physiotherapy at home as well, I was able to return to school to finish my sixth grade.

My proudest moments as a Shriner:

There are so many that there's no special one that I can say stands out above others. From 2004 – present time being involved with the Outreach Clinic there has been many proud moments on my journey as a Shriner. Time spent with patients and families, many looking for hope and support to make life better for the children has been satisfying, fulfilling and gratifying.

It is our fervent hope that if we all still honestly believe in what being a Shriner stands for and are still willing to uphold the obligation which we took at our initiations then we can make this happen together.

Think about it Nobles, it is really not an insurmountable task if we all truly work at it together. Go out to your lodges, talk to your fellow brethren. Suggest a Shrine presentation at your lodge. If every one of us recruited just 1 new member we would be well on our way to having the numbers that Mazol once enjoyed .
